is not to depart from her husband. But even if she does depart, let her remain unmarried or be reconciled to her husband. And a husband is not to divorce his wife" (10-11). The reader can readily observe that departing in this case refers to divorcing for two reasons. First, departure leaves her "unmarried." Second. the corresponding instruction to the man is to "not divorce his wife." Divorcing is sinful and, if divorce already occurred, the situation must not be worsened with a subsequent marriage. Jesus already taught that would amount to adultery. To presume that a man who separated from his wife has divorced her is not sensible. By divorcing her when he was ready to marry another, he proved his awareness of this.

When he began committing fornication while still married, he made himself as guilty as his wife. Both he and his wife deserved to be put away, but, because both were guilty, neither had the right to act against the other. Thus, he must "remain unmarried or be reconciled." Subsequent marriage is adultery and "adulterers... will not inherit the kingdom of God" (1st Corinthians 6:9-10).

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#### SEPARATION IS NOT DIVORCE

Although sinners argue against it, Jesus has made clear His teaching against divorce and remarriage with but one exception. He preached, "Whoever divorces his wife, except for sexual immorality, and marries another, commits adultery; and whoever marries her who is divorced commits adultery" (Matthew 19:9).

A question arises regarding a particular scenario. A certain man caught his wife committing sexual immorality and, instead of divorcing her, obtained a legal separation. The couple parted ways, and each person entered sexual relationships with others. Eventually, the man took up with a woman he decided to marry; so, he divorced his wife and married the new woman. Whether that new marriage is legitimate is a serious concern with eternal ramifications.

Separation is not divorce. One chapter of Scripture mentions separation and divorce as distinct actions. In the context of ordinary conjugal privileges, Paul told husbands and wives, "Do not deprive one another except with consent for a time, that you may give yourselves to fasting and prayer; and come together again so that Satan does not tempt you" (1st Corinthians 7:5). While the word "separation" does not appear in this verse, the concept is manifest insomuch as the mutually agreed upon deprivation would conclude when they "come together again." Five verses later, the apostle addressed divorce, saying, "A wife – Continued on page 4 –

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
