"THE GOVERNMENT WILL BE UPON HIS SHOULDER"

By the mouth of Isaiah the prophet, God foretold the reign of His Only Begotten: "For unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given; and the government will be upon His shoulder. And His name will be called Wonderful, Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Of the increase of His government and peace there will be no end, upon the throne of David and over His kingdom, to order it and establish it with judgment and justice from that time forward, even forever. The zeal of Jehovah of hosts will perform this" (Isaiah 9:6-7). This prophecy of Christ's rule ascribes to Him many names and roles. With emphasis on His governance, consider what else He is called.

He is Captain and Prince. "For it was fitting for Him, for whom are all things and by whom are all things, in bringing many sons to glory, to make the captain of their salvation perfect through sufferings" (Hebrews 2:10). In English, captaincy connotes either military rank or command of a vessel. The Greek from which it is translated is less specific, simply meaning a chief leader. Thus, the same Greek word is used to describe Jesus as the "Prince of life" (Acts 3:15) and "Prince and Savior" (5:31). It is also used to name Him "the author and finisher of our faith" (Hebrews 12:2).

He is Lord. "He is Lord of lords" (Revelation 17:14; 19:16). This is translated from a word which denotes supremacy. Thus, His Lordship over all who are called lords means He is absolutely supreme. That makes Him "Lord of all" (Acts 10:36), "Lord of both the dead and the living" (Romans 14:9), "Lord of glory" (1st Corinthians 2:8), and "Lord of peace" (2nd Thessalonians 3:16).

He is King. "He is King of kings" (Revelation 17:14; 19:16). The Greek behind this word indicates sovereignty, meaning He is "ruler over the kings of the earth" (Revelation 1:5). He sits a throne in heaven (Hebrews 8:1; 12:2). He wears a golden crown (Revelation 14:4; Hebrews 2:9). He wields a righteous scepter (Hebrews 1:8; cf. Genesis 49:10). Even others who have been granted thrones and crowns abandon them to glorify Him! "Around the throne were twenty-four thrones, and on the thrones I saw twenty-four elders sitting, clothed in white robes; and they had crowns of gold on their heads... the twenty-four elders fall down before Him who sits on the throne and worship Him who lives forever and ever, and cast their crowns before the throne, saying: You are worthy, O Lord, to receive glory and – Continued on page 3 –

BAD AND GOOD SHEPHERDS

God chastised the leaders of His nation Israel (Ezekiel 34) by comparing them to bad shepherds. Look at their actions and inactions.

God loves and highly values His flock of people and expects the same from His shepherds.

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honor and power; for You created all things, and by Your will they exist and were created" (Revelation 4:4, 10-11).

He is Preeminent. "In all things He may have the preeminence. For it pleased the Father that in Him all the fullness should dwell" (Colossians 1:15-19). Definitively, He occupies first place in everything. Considering His Godhood (15), His Creative power (15-17), His headship over the church (18), and His resurrective authority (18), He is God's fullness and that makes Him preeminent. Therefore, He is right to claim, "All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth" (Matthew 28:18). He is seated "far above all principality and power and might and dominion, and every name that is named, not only in this age but also in that which is to come" (Ephesians 1:21).

In view of all that Christ is and the power He possesses, it is only right to submit. "At the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of those in heaven, and of those on earth, and of those under the earth, and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Philippians 2:10-11).

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HELP ME GET ONE MORE

The 2016 film Hacksaw Ridge is a dramatic retelling of how a conscientious objector named Desmond Doss came to be awarded the Medal of Honor. Private Doss refused to carry a rifle into battle, but enlisted during World War II to be a combat medic. During the Battle of Okinawa, at great risk to himself, PFC Doss lowered 75 injured American soldiers, one by one, over a 400-foot escarpment to safety below. Throughout the ordeal, he kept praying, "Please Lord, help me get one more. Help me get one more." Focused on one casualty at a time, not the lot of them all at once, the hero was able to rescue his wounded comrades.

The purpose of the church is to bring the message of salvation in Christ Jesus to every sinner the world over. It would be a thrill to see 3,000 souls in a day washed of their sins, as happened that first Pentecost following the Lord's ascension (Acts 2;41). For that matter, it would be quite satisfying to witness a whole household receive their sins' forgiveness (Acts 11:14; 16:15, 33; 18:8; 1st Corinthians 1:16). If either is to happen, God will be glorified, angels will rejoice, and Christians will be edified. Yet, until then, let every disciple pray, "Please Lord, help me get one more.
